From the Minister

UU Feet!

Have we ever considered the tension between what it is to be Universalist? Perhaps not for a while, so as I anticipate foot surgery at the end of this month, I'll explain. At the end of my left foot are what I call my Unitarian toes. At the end of my right foot are what I call my Universalist toes (aspiring at least). Yes, they are on one body, just as the strands of Unitarianism and Universalism became one body with their 1961 merger. But habits of history have a way of holding on.

Unitarians have long been known for our individualism—from "the inherent worth and dignity of every person," the principle that dates back only to 1986, to Ralph Waldo Emerson's "Self-Reliance," the essay that dates back to 1841. Perhaps this emphasis on the individual is grounded in Unitarianism as the notion of the oneness of God. Community and interdependence can easily fade in this theology of singularity. What can emerge is what Rev. Fred Muir, a contemporary UU minister, has called the iChurch. Community is sacrificed on the altar of "I" and "me." This is what has happened on my left food. The big toe ("the boss") has leapt aggressively over the second toe and allowed all those smaller toes to lean in at something like a 45-degree angle. When I try to remind the big toe that it's part of a series, it ignores me and lops back into its bully position. We as Unitarians can easily do the same, especially if the squeaky wheel(s) in

our congregations assume solo voice as a habit and other members lean in, unable (or unwilling) to challenge. As for those ornery toes, it's time for foot surgery—specifically March 27.

On the other foot, the 2nd-5th toes lean also, trying to force the big toe into the same bossy stance as on my left foot. But the big toe of my right foot was corrected long ago by foot surgery and calls for more cooperation than is the case with its counterpart on the left. Ergo, the toes on my right foot form what might be called an aspiring collaborative, aka aspiring Universalists. They're not perfect, but they're trying; and like it or not, they work as a team with relative effectiveness. Somehow, they get that they're part of "an interconnected web," that principle of Unitarian Universalism that also dates back only to 1986. Universalism itself dates back to the 2nd c. AD and the teachings of Origen of Alexandria, who held that a loving God would eventually bring everyone to heaven. Even if there were a few detours in Origen's map, his theology was overall inclusive—i.e. universalist.

No perfect feet, no perfect toes, no perfect body—mine or yours or that which we recognize as Unitarian Universalist. Might we aspire in our larger UU world and in this congregation to affirm that none of us as individuals is the be-all-and-end-all, but we are each interdependent with every other member,

every other congregation, and part of the larger interdependent web.

UUCM Board of Trustees Goals and Objectives 2018-2019

- Hire an Interim Minister in June to begin on Aug. 1, 2019.
- Welcome and integrate new Interim Minister into congregational life.

Goal 3 (Long Term): Review and establish governance infrastructure, policy and procedures

Objectives

- Become incorporated and maintain incorporation with the CT Secretary of the State by ______(date).
- Review and revise UUCM Bylaws by _____(date).
- Review, revise and adopt new policies, guidelines and procedures for UUCM (on-going).
- Develop a culture of transparency, from the Board of Trustees and Councils, Committees/Teams and Task Forces, to the congregation.
- Review and revise and/or develop and implement one- and three-to-five-year goals and objectives from the Board of Trustees, Councils, Committees/Teams and Task Forces.
- Maintain fiscal sustainability for the short and long term.

Goal 4 (Short and Long Term): Develop collaborative relationships with other churches and the wider community.

Objectives

- Collaborate with other Unitarian Universalist congregations.
- Intentionally become a regional church.
- Collaborate with other houses of worship.

During our regular **Anti-Racism** meetings on the first Tuesday of each month, we are continuing to discuss the book *White Fragility* by Robin DiAngelo. We will also be discussing being one of the sponsors for a Fundraiser for the **CT Immigrant Bail Fund**, sponsored by New Sanctuary CT, on

Have you heard about the new federal legislation "Green New Deal," which is a 10-year plan to mobilize every aspect of American society toward 100% clean and renewable energy, guarantee a good job to all members of our society, and create economic prosperity? This may sound like a lofty plan that is out of reach, but there is a newly started grassroots group, "Sunrise Movement," whose mission is to create change by urging local federal Representatives to pursue the passage of this or like legislation. Chalice Sanctuary Team

The Chalice Sanctuary Team continues to work with activist and faith-based organizations that work on immigrants' rights. Our church is getting support from those organizations in our work to sustain sanctuary for Sujitno and Dahlia. We are planning to have a Q&A information session for the congregation at the March 10 church service. We hope you can join us so you can hear more about what is going on and can ask questions or offer opinions or suggestions to the Team.

There was a demonstration in front of the ICE building in Hartford on February 8. It was a cold, rainy day, but it was still well attended. We got good press coverage in both print and TV media. Both Rev, Jan and I spoke, as did Senator Blumenthal and Attorney General William Tong. We hope to have more actions to keep pressure on ICE to free Sujitno and keep the public aware of his continued self-incarceration in our church. Along with CIRA (Connecticut Immigrants' Rights Alliance), we have launched a phone campaign to the ICE leadership in both Hartford and the regional

office. Outside groups have been involved and supportive along with members of our congregation.

Our congregation has been supporting Sujitno and Dahlia in sanctuary for a long time now. A member of the Unitarian Society of New Haven, Sarah Foreman, has joined our team, and she has been a breath of fresh air that we have needed. Financially we have had enough support from outside faith communities and individuals so that we have not had to shoulder all of this responsibility ourselves. USNH has continued to be a particularly wonderful source of financial support. However, we offer other types of support that do have an effect on all of us. The CST members are acutely aware of this and the fact that people can begin to feel burned out. Unfortunately, the legal system, particularly the immigration system, does not move quickly. We can fill you in on more particulars when we meet. I asked Sujitno's lawyer recently if she is optimistic about whether we will see freedom for Sujitno, which is our end goal. She wanted to be careful but said she is more optimistic than pessimistic that we will see a good outcome, and that our efforts on Sujitno and Dahlia's behalf will lead to them being able to remain in the country they have called home for over 30 years. It is important for all of us to realize the march for justice is a marathon, not a sprint. We need to hold each other up on the journey. N. Burton
