From the Minister



Beginning and Beginning are at the heart of transition.

So it is with transition in professional ministry, woven with the dynamic that is shared ministry. Over the past seven years, you and I have ministered together in modes pastoral and prophetic through the media of worship, religious education, justice making, facilities tending, governance, stewardship and finance—all dimensions of practicing loving community, advancing justice, and nurturing spiritual growth. We have been and you will continue to be a community that is spiritual and religious. Without the spiritual power of love, religion lacks heart. Without the communal power of religion, spirituality lacks accountability. We are woven, complex, and aspiring to live our mission, realize our Unitarian Universalist principles and purposes, and draw from the riches of resources theological and historic. What evolves is connection, deep connection that transforms each of us and which each of us shape.

Next to LOVE, my favorite theological word is GRACE. Grace distills goodness that is unearned; it encompasses beauty; it holds wonder. By the grace of God some of us say; others say, by the grace of Love. I understand the two as synonymous. By the essence of grace, we have walked together and as we travel these final steps together, know that I am grateful for the grace we have known, the stories we have shared, the justice we have sought to practice, the laughter and the tears, the equanimity and the conflict from which I trust we have grown, the strengths we have realized, and the challenges that remain. In this final month of my ministry with you, I invite you for a conversation—to share whatever is in your heart—rather like a community candles interlude with me. What's in your heart? What would you like to share that you have left unshared until now? What would you yet hope for from me? Know that as I depart form ministry with you as of June 30, I honor my covenant with my Unitarian Universalist colleagues and our larger Unitarian Universalist world to sever ties for at least two years. This means that I will not contact you, and I ask you not to contact me. I will not attend worship services or events held at the Meeting House. This allows the new professional ministry and the texture of your next chapter to take root. It further allows my next chapter to take form—with family and

Welcome Rev. Tony Lorenzen



After a twomonth search process, the Transition Team of Jane Dioguardi, Tina Caplan, and Jeff May recommended

the appointment of Rev. Tony Lorenzen as our new minister beginning in August. The Board approved the appointment on May 24th.

Rev. Tony was born in Fitchburg MA, and received his Master of Divinity degree from Harvard in 1994. He became a U.U. in 2003 after leaving the Catholic Church and was ordained to UU Ministry in 2007 by First Church

in Leominster, MA. He has served congregations in Massachusetts and Texas and has had experience leading multiple congregations who are sharing professional ministry, as we will be doing with the Mattatuck Unitarian Universalist Society (MUUS) in Woodbury.

According to the Transition Team members, Tony stood out as not only the best candidate who applied, but as a perfect match . . . "We feel like we hit the lottery."

Rev. Tony shares our passion for Social Justice ministry – in fact, one of the things that attracted him to our congregation is the social justice work that we have been doing. His enthusiasm is infectious, and his warmth and genuine love for the world come through in the first few minutes of speaking with him. Tony believes very strongly in shared ministry. On his website he writes,

"Our partnership will be a spiritual one, grounded in the best foundations of humanistic religion. My training in spiritual direction has taught me how to listen attentively to the lives of individuals and communities. The better we are able to listen to our congregation, its people, and the surrounding community, the more spiritually grounded we will be, and we'll be better able to serve our community through our outreach programs and social justice partnerships."

Tony will begin his official ministry with us on August 19th. He will co-lead worship with Rev. Jan here in Meriden on June 16th. There is a possibility that we may be putting together a joint worship experience sometime in August with our congregation and MUUS... more on that will be announced soon.

The Meriden Transition Team worked together with three members of MUUS in the selection process, and the MUUS team shares our enthusiasm. Together with MUUS, we are hiring Tony full-time as a transitional minister,

and he will divide his time equally between the two congregations. Rev. Tony will work with us and MUUS under a year-by-year "contract ministry" arrangement, and we will be setting goals for what we hope to accomplish during his time with us.

Our sadness in parting with Rev. Jan as she moves into retirement is tempered by the possibilities of what lies ahead. Rev. Jan, who has worked with Tony both in his early years as a UU Minister and on the Board of the UU Ministers Association, is thrilled with our selection and feels we have made the perfect choice. "I could not be happier that I will pass the torch to Tony Lorenzen," she said.

BOT Update

On Thursday, May 16, 2019, the UU Meriden Board of Trustees held two meetings:

with the Board of the Mattatuck
Unitarian Universalist Society (MUUS),
in which we discussed and came to a
conclusion on our two congregations'
upcoming yoked ministry and an update
on our ministerial transition.

 The second meeting was strictly for the UU Meriden Board, in which we received a report on our recent Annual Stewardship Campaign.

The next meeting of the UU Meriden Board of Trustees will be held on Thursday, June 13, 2019 at 7:00 PM in the Pete Seeger (Lavender) Room on the Religious Education floor. All meetings of the Board of Trustees are open to the congregation as observers, except for those cases when the meeting goes into Executive Session.

Chalice Sanctuary



The afternoon of May 31 marked a celebration of Sujitno and Dahlia Sajuti's freedom to return home to West Hartford after 599 days in sanctuary at our church. Sujitno's legal team has secured assurance from ICE (Immigration & Customs Enforcement) that they no longer have jurisdiction over Sujitno and Dahlia's case and will no longer pursue them. Senator Richard Blumenthal, an advocate for Sujitno from the beginning of his stay here, was present to celebrate with us, along with a representative from Attorney General William Tong, City Councilman Miguel Castro, and a throng of congregants and friends and supporters. The press was here in full force, and in addition to Senator Blumenthal, we heard from Attorney

General Tong's spokesperson; Diana Blank, lead attorney with the New Haven Legal Assistance team, which has provided pro bono counsel; Alok Bhatt, from Connecticut Immigrant Rights Alliance; Sujitno and Dahlia; Rev. Jan; and Nancy Burton, coordinator of our Chalice Sanctuary Team that has overseen this ministry of sanctuary.

This victory is communal. The outcome speaks for the power of working together with perseverance. The march toward justice is a marathon, not a sprint. Sujitno and Dahlia are now able to observe the rest of Ramadan with their own faith community.

We hope you will join us for an additional celebration on Saturday, June 8 at 5 pm, which also marks the first day at this church of the traveling photo exhibit featuring Sujitno and also Nelson Pinos. Nelson has been in sanctuary for over a year and a half at First and Summerfield Church in New Haven. This will now be a partial celebration of Sujitno's release, for Nelson remains in sanctuary. Please bring finger food to share. Donations will be collected at the door to help Sujitno and Dahlia get back on their feet financially. The work for justice for our undocumented immigrant neighbors continues.

The Beautiful Thing You Protect

Rev. Sean Parker Dennison writes, "The ability to see beauty is the beginning of our moral sensibility. What we believe is beautiful we will not wantonly destroy."

Rev. Mary Katherine Morn writes, "Beauty does more than awaken us. It also admonishes us. It demands something... We are here so that together we might heed the admonitions of beauty. Answer its call to create, protect, and preserve."

Reverends Morn and Parker Dennison remind us that beauty is more than a salve. It does more than restore and soothe. It creates commitment. It lures us into loving it and becomes something we can't live without. We end up willing to give our lives for it. We protect it at all costs.

So, what is that beautiful thing you protect at all costs? That core beautiful thing you defend like a mama bear because you know you'd be lost without it? For some of us, it's a form of nature. For others, it's a type of justice. For still others, it's a way of treating each other, like kindness. Or treating ourselves, like self-love. Whatever it is, we all build our lives around it. Look closely and you'll notice how deeply it defines us. By protecting it, we protect ourselves.

Spend some time this month getting clear about that piece of beauty that turns you into a mama bear. After all, isn't getting clear about it what life is all about?

Word Roots: The Greek word for the beautiful is kalon, which is related to the word kalein, which includes the notion of 'call," suggesting that there is something about beauty, wherever we find it, that tugs at us, pulls at us, drawing us into the divine.

A second Greek word for beauty is hōraios, from hōra, meaning "hour." Beauty was thus associated with "being of one's hour." Thus, a ripe fruit (of its time) was considered beautiful, whereas a young person trying to appear older or an older person trying to appear younger would not be considered beautiful.

The Ancient Greeks also equated beauty with harmony and virtue, which brings together the

ideas of "call" and "hour." Beauty is not a static experience but one of being in the rightness of the moment, an expression of the divine.

Treasurer's Report

Treasurer's Report June 2019

The results for the first nine months of the Fiscal Year 2018-19 show us with a positive Net Operating Income.

Here are the details.

Our gross income is \$101,795.24. Our total expenses are \$101,423.52. Therefore, net income is \$371.72. The gross income includes pledges, collection plate, rentals, fundraising, special donations.

Here is a breakdown of our sources of income. Pledges make up 77% of our income. Rentals and fundraising make up 15% of our income. The remaining 8% of our income is a combination of collection plate, special donations, and miscellaneous income. Thank you to all for your generous donations. Please continue to make every effort to meet your financial commitment.
