Message from Rev. Tony -"Living Up to Expectations"

Dear Holy Ones,

I can't wait to begin our journey together. I'm eager to meet everyone and hear your stories. What an exciting time this is! New beginnings are overflowing with expectations, and the beginning of a new ministry is no exception. Hope is high, anticipation is great, and possibility is in the air. There's an energy in the air not unlike Christmas Eve, a first date, and the premier of the next Star Wars movie - I hope I get the gift I wanted, I hope they like me, I hope this installment does the franchise justice! I don't know about you, but I have been blessed time and again in ways I didn't expect. I hoped for one thing, got something different and was initially disappointed but eventually discovered (sometimes sooner and sometimes later) once again the enduring wisdom of the Rollings Stones: I didn't get what I wanted but I got what I needed.

There are fewer things more energizing than high hopes, but there are few things as demoralizing as dashed expectations. Dashed expectations bring out various emotions such as disappointment, resentment, and anger. These feelings erode faith, trust, and relationships. Because of this, we need to treat expectations with a sacred spirit. Frequently, unmet expectations are the result of the expectations being unreasonable. Some of the things that make for unreasonable expectations include putting too many eggs in one basket, not agreeing with others (or even yourself) what the expectations should be, and putting too much responsibility for meeting expectations on one person or group.

Let's kick off this new church year and new ministry together by discussing expectations. Just what are our hopes and dreams? How will we go about achieving them? How will we treat each other along the way? I'm looking forward to a lot of conversations about these things in the coming weeks as you teach me about the congregation, where it's been, and where you think we should go next. I'm also looking forward to learning about the current expectations in the congregation - How is worship done? How are things communicated? How are decisions made? What are the important customs, rituals, special events, and ways of doing things?

As this new shared ministry begins, I joyfully welcome your help as I learn about and come to understand current expectations so that as time goes on, I can joyfully offer feedback on setting goals for the future and how to meet the expectations that go along with them. See you soon!

Social Justice Activities



When you watch the news and say to yourself, "What can I do to bring an end to the brutality, hatred, and abuse of immigrants in our country, in our state, in our towns?"—

YOU CAN ACT:

IF YOU ARE A BORN CITIZEN OF THE UNITED STATES, AND ESPECIALLY IF YOU ARE WHITE, YOU NEED TO SPEAK UP. The most important acts of resistance are the small ones. Make it difficult and uncomfortable for ICE agents to do their jobs. They are counting on citizens to turn a blind eye.

If you witness a Border Patrol or ICE agent verifying citizenship:

It is perfectly legal to record immigration agents as long as you are not on government property or at a port of entry. If your train/bus gets boarded, pull out your phone and start videotaping immediately.

IF YOU WANT TO DO MORE:

If you are on a train, bus, or anything else and ICE or CBP boards, stand up and loudly let everyone know that they have the right to remain silent or only answer questions in the presence of an attorney, no matter their citizenship or immigration status. There have been numerous reports that this has caused ICE agents to leave without verifying citizenship. THIS CAN SAVE LIVES.

Here are the legalities:

-Border Patrol/ICE agents can verify citizenship within 100 miles of a land or coastal border.

-Border Patrol/ICE agents can only ask brief questions about citizenship, and they cannot hold anyone for an extended time without cause.

-Everyone, regardless of citizenship status, has the right to remain silent. No one needs to answer their questions.

As white citizens, we have a level of privilege which protects us from retaliation from ICE for being "rude" and making a scene to help ensure that people without the same privilege know their rights.

ALSO contact the ACLU or your local Immigrant/Migrant support organizations if you see someone's rights being violated.

REMEMBER: If you have ever wondered what you'd have done during slavery, the Holocaust, the Civil Rights Movement: You're doing it right now.

Board of Trustees Update

The Board of Trustees met on Thursday August 15. Highlights of the meeting include

- Sandy Duffy's mother will donate up to \$5,000 to our church if we match her donation. Sandy announced this on Sunday August 18. This will help close our budget shortfall.
- The Water Communion service is being planned.

 We need an audit team to review our books. The audit must be completed by 9-30-19.

The next meeting of the UU Meriden Board of Trustees will be held on Thursday Sept 19 at 7:00 PM in the Pete Seeger (Lavender) Room on the Religious Education floor. All meetings of the Board of Trustees are open to the congregation as observers, except for those cases when the meeting goes into Executive Session.

Treasurer's Report

I know there are many questions about the church's

financial position. Did fiscal year '18-'19 end with a surplus or deficit? Has a budget deficit for fiscal year '19-'20 been resolved? If not, how does the Board of Trustees plan to close the deficit? What if I pledged, are there ways I can help the church beyond my pledge? I will answer each of these questions.

Did fiscal year '18-'19 end with a surplus or deficit? For fiscal year 2018-19, UU Meriden ended the year with a small surplus, \$31.99. The surplus will be applied to the FY 2019-20 budget. Has the budget deficit for FY '19-'20 been resolved? We are getting closer to a balanced budget. The deficit has been reduced to \$10,000. The Board of Trustees has accepted an offer of a matching gift. Faith Duffy, Sandy Duffy's mother, has offered to match any new pledges or increases in pledges, up to \$5,000. You will be hearing more about the matching gift soon.

Are there ways I can help the church beyond my pledge? Yes! You can help with UUCM's fundraising activities. Here are two opportunities to help this fall:

Buy Stop and Shop Cards: We want to sell \$10,000-worth of Stop & Shop cards this year. Sounds impossible? It's not. We have sold \$4500-worth of Stop and Shop cards to date. We have added a second way to buy S&S cards. You can preorder the cards—and you can request your card(s) in the domination(s) of your choice. This is a great way to buy these cards. We will be selling them on Sundays after the worship service, as well.

The second way is to join the Holiday Fair team! The Holiday Fair is Friday, December 6 and Saturday, December 7. We need help with making crafts, making cookies, setup, and help on the day of the fair. This year, we want to sell more crafts from members of the congregation.
