## Message from Rev. Tony -"Waking Up to What We Do"

Dear Holy Ones,

One of the first things that most people notice when they take up a meditation practice is how unsettled and uncomfortable it is. Not only are most people not used to actually "sitting still" without moving, but just about everyone is not used to keeping their mind still - ignoring inner dialog and letting distracting thoughts rise and pass without giving them one's ongoing attention.

Meditation is not about turning your mind off, zoning out, or falling asleep. Rather meditation is about paying attention, focusing on something so attentively that everything else falls away. This focus object may be one's breath, a mantra (a repeated phrase or word), a chant.

Initial attempts at this type of focus frequently lead to finding a mind not only not willing to settle down, but intent on disrupting the attempt to focus with unpleasant memories, unwanted emotions, and free-floating anxiety. Most people need to work through this initial sometimes unpleasant unease at the beginning of their practice.

Sticking with the practice, however, yields an amazing gift - the increased ability to pay attention and to be mindful (and not mindless) not only when we meditate, but also as we go about our daily living. We will spend this month exploring paying attention. Let us not be distracted from what it might have to teach us.

The Board of Trustees met on Tuesday October 15, 2019. Highlights of the meeting include:

 Kathleen Lindberg and Paula Snedeker, by unanimous vote of the Board of Trustees, will be swapping Board roles. Paula is now our new Clerk, and Kathy will resume her position as a Trustee-at-Large.

intergenerational program of the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) to raise support for and awareness about key human rights issues. **The 2019-20 theme is "Women Leaders, Strong Communities.**" UUSC always partners with those who are affected by human rights violations throughout the world. This year the UUSC is proud to partner with women leaders who are increasing representation for women in their communities, while strengthening access to justice for all. During this year's GAYT program, please join us in learning more about women leaders from UUSC partner organizations taking on some of today's greatest human rights challenges.

Join with UUSC for Guest at Your Table to learn more about UUSC's partner organizations' women's leadership. This is an opportunity to celebrate grassroots partnership, support human rights, and learn about just four of these women – the "guests" of the Guest at Your Table programs. The four guests who represent this year's theme are:

## **Development Team Update**

## The UUCM Development Team will be Jeff

May, Kurtis Jalbert, Liz Hall, and Steve Volpini. The team met for the first time on Oct. 2. They will meet monthly on the 1st Wednesday. Minutes of the team's meetings will be posted online and in the church. A report and minutes will be sent to the Board of Trustees each month. Questions or comments about the Development Team and its work may be directed to any of its members.

## The UUCM Development Team's Mission and charge:

The mission of the development team is to serve the mission of the congregation by working with the congregation and the minister to help the congregation engage the tasks of developmental ministry, be a resource and advocate for the minister in their work on the process tasks of developmental ministry, and to assist the board in setting 3-5 goals for the development of the congregation over the next 3-5 years.

# The UUCM Development Team adopted this Covenant:

#### We promise:

To serve with grace, remembering this is a service to our faith community, and our task is to further the congregation's mission by our work.

To speak with one voice to the congregation about our work.

To dedicate enough time to our work, even if that means diminishing our congregational involvement elsewhere.

To start and end our meetings on time. To avoid triangulation, avoid parking lot conversations, and avoid taking things personally.

To be proactive, not reactive in our work with the congregation.

To promote a sense of hope, possibility, and abundance in the congregation.

To be honest and direct in sharing our feelings as well as our thoughts.

To participate before we evaluate.

To assume best intentions and that everyone is doing the best they can.

#### Background information on the Tasks and Processes of the congregation and minister during the developmental period:

These are **Rev. Tony's pastoral tasks** as the new minister in an intentionally developmental setting:

Process Task 1: Joining the System Process Task 2: Analyzing the System Process Task 3: Connecting with the Denomination Process Task 4: Focusing and Assuming Responsibility Process Task 5: Exiting and Evaluating

**The Congregation's tasks** as a group going through an intentionally developmental time:

Developmental Task 1: Understanding how the group's history plays out in the present Developmental Task 2: Investing in congregational Mission and UU Identity with vigor

Developmental Task 3: Leadership changes; allow new people to steer us forward Developmental Task 4: Creating and/or renewing community partnerships Developmental Task 5: Commitment to new directions

#### UUCM Development Team Methodology

The Team will use Appreciative Inquiry methods for interviewing, investigating, researching, and processing our work.

#### Approach - Appreciative Inquiry

Appreciative Inquiry is a method of organizational development that engages all levels of an organization (and its stakeholders) in its renewal, change, and improved performance. It works on the assumption that there is something positive on which more can be built. It is a positive method that does not look back on what goes wrong or went wrong. Focusing on exceptional performance and on strengths has a motivational effect. This approach values existing capacities and talents and is participatory in nature.

Use Appreciative Inquiry for: Strategic planning, Project planning, Action planning, Monitoring and evaluation, Alternative team building, Network and community development, To uncover the positive forces that exist in an organization, To create openness and stimulate innovation, To address challenges and conflicts, and for problem solving.

#### 4-D Model - Discovery, Design, Dream, Destiny

The exercise can take place in the framework of a meeting or event (such as a retreat) or over a longer period of time. Different teams/working groups can take on the work done by others in previous stages of the process.

DISCOVERY Appreciate "the best of what is" identifying what works well in the organization (or division, section, field presence) through structured interviews or through storytelling.

DESIGN Determine "what should be" envisioning processes that would work well in the future. Under the guidance of a facilitator, participants imagine that the good practices identified in the discovery phase are the norm rather than the exception. DREAM Imagine "what could be" - planning and prioritizing processes that work well. Identify ways to make the ideal organization of the dream phase a reality.

DESTINY Create "what will be" -

implementation of the proposed design, usually a phase of experimentation and improvisation.



## Treasurer's Report

The results for the first three months (July through Sept.)

of Fiscal Year 2019-20 show us with a positive net income. Here are the details.

Our gross income was \$31,305.23. Our total expenses were \$28,017.80. Therefore, net income is \$3,287.43. The gross income includes pledges, collection plate, rentals, fundraising, special donations. Pledges make up 77% of our income. Thank you to all for your generous donations. Please continue to make every effort to meet your financial commitment.

The Faith Duffy Challenge is going well. Members and friends have donated \$3290. We're close to closing the budget gap, so if you haven't contributed to the challenge fund, I hope you will do so before the end of the fiscal year. And THANK YOU to those who have already contributed.

The Stop & Shop cards fundraiser is off to a great start. In September and October, the fundraising committee has sold \$1,825-worth of Stop & Shop cards. We are well on our way toward the goal of selling \$6,000-worth of Stop & Shop cards.
