Message from Rev. Tony -"A Season of Wonder and Awe"

Dear Holy Ones,

I don't remember how old I was, but I couldn't have been more than twelve or so. I had just finished delivering papers on my paper route. Yes, Gen X, the last generation to have experienced the door to door delivery of the paper route. My route ended at the top of a small hill, just up the street from my house. It had snowed earlier in the day and everything was covered with the type of snow that only seems to exist in Christmas movies and romantic winter scenes. Silver, sparkling, the newly risen moon and streetlight bouncing rays off the crystals. It felt incredibly appropriate, seeing as it was Christmas Eve. The air was cold and crisp and your breath made smoke like incense that rose to Heaven. I followed one big exhale up as it dispersed toward the sky above my head. It was then I noticed the stars. The sky was black and clear, not a cloud left over anywhere from the earlier snow storm. The multitudes of stars sparkled like the snow crystals in the moonlight. And there was one star, brighter than all the rest. Whether it was or not, or whether I needed it to be, or whether it was probably a planet and not a star didn't matter, then or now. That star was shining down on me, just like the star of Bethlehem. I was beginning to question the mysteries of faith of my Catholic upbringing, and I remember

wondering if stories about kings following stars to babies could be real. Yet, there I was caught in the mystery and the wonder of a star on Christmas Eve, and I remember being filled with a strange calm and *felt* more than *heard* something divine saying, "Yes." Yes to what? Yes, to love and peace and belonging and feeling okay with everything. And that's how I felt in that moment. That was, I reflect each Christmas, the first time I felt touched by the profound mystery that is the divine and filled with an incredible awe and wonder. In my darkest times, the memory of that mysterious "yes" carries me through. Enter into the mystery of the story as it is told again this year, and may your holiday season be filled with holy light, wonder, love, hope and awe.

President's Column

You're a Mean One, Mrs. Grinch!

For a long time during my adult life, Christmas was NOT my favorite time of year. Things I normally enjoyed, like buying presents for loved ones and baking my family's favorite goodies, started feeling more like chores than blessings. Like most people, I was taking care of a home and family and holding down a full-time job (as well as teaching English to adults two nights a week). You may know the feeling—managing to get it all done but being relieved when it's all over.

But gradually things started to change for me. As we hit late middle age, the adults of my family decided to pare down our gift-giving to each other, doing a Secret Santa in which each of us bought one carefully thought-out present for one person. My friends, many of whom were retired, also decided to cut down on gift giving. I looked at my long list of "mandatory" baked goods and reconsidered: Do we really eat all this stuff? (It should have been a wakeup call when I found a Tupperware container of leftover Christmas cookies in the freezer one July!)

As UUs, we're conscious of the needs of others. One person told me that the first holiday gift she spends money on every year is an anonymous monetary one to someone she knows is in need. An easy way to do this would be to contribute to our Minister's Discretionary Fund. Rev. Tony is aware of who might be going through rough times, and will soon have a Pastoral Care Team to help him out with this important work. People are unusually generous this time of year, but that generosity tapers off once the new year begins, so let's keep our hearts open year-round.

In the meantime, I'll be getting out my Mrs. Santa outfit and baking cookies for our holiday fair. Those are things that spark joy!

Dear Members and Friends,

Guest at Your Table (GAYT) is the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee's annual intergenerational program to raise support for and awareness about key

human rights issues. UUSC is a different type of helping organization in that they partner with organizations already on site, taking their lead in what is needed.

This is an opportunity to celebrate grassroots partnership with organizations led by women, and learn about just four of these women - the "guests" in Guest at Your Table. Four guests represent this year's theme: Pelenise, a climate activist from Kiribati who is responding boldly to climate change in the Pacific; Marta, who is working to support victims of violence and eradicate violence against women in Honduras; Wai Wai, who is helping prevent violence and bridge ethnic and religious divides in Burma; and Monica, who is using the arts to bolster resiliency and leadership among migrants in Mexico and the U.S. Please refer to the "Stories of Hope" booklet for more information about each and their work.

By now you have received the special "Guest at Your Table" box handed out at the November 24th service. We hope you are regularly filling your box with coins and currency, which will be sent to the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) for their good work in supporting justice-seeking missions around the world. We will collect this money in February 2020 when we have our annual Stone Soup Luncheon, date to be announced.

Message from the Minister -Memorial Service for Meiden's Homeless

Dear Holy Ones,

I want you to join me at a special inaugural event in Meriden highlighting the issue of homelessness in our community. As we stop each year to remember those who have been killed for being transgender, so we are asked to stop and remember those who have died from homelessness. We have served as a sanctuary church space and while they were here, Sujitno and Dahlia were homeless. Not only can we make a difference in drawing attention to the need to address homelessness in Meriden, but we can teach our community about those living in sanctuary. Any homelessness, living on the street or in sanctuary, is due to our society turning its attention away from need and the pain of others.

The Meriden Clergy Association, of which I am a member, along with New Opportunities and The Salvation Army will host the First Annual Memorial Service and Candlelight Vigil for the Homeless on Sunday, December 15, 2019 at 23 St. Casmir Drive in Meriden (The Salvation Army) from 4-6 p.m. Light refreshments will follow. We will remember the homeless among us and those homeless who are deceased, and we invite you to join the fight to end homelessness.

You are invited to bring a hat, pair of gloves or scarf that will be distributed by The Salvation Army during the winter months. Please join in solidarity with local friends and neighbors in honoring our friend and colleague, Pastor John Blossom, who died unexpectedly this summer. He was a passionate advocate for the homeless, and to honor him, we take time in this busy season to remember the homeless.

I sincerely hope you will join me on December 15th. Perhaps we can help make homelessness in our community an issue that is remembered on more than just one a day a year or during the winter season.

Treasurer's Report

The results for the first four months (July through

October) of Fiscal Year 2019-20 show us with positive net income. Here are the details.

Our gross operating income was \$38,803.90. Our total expenses were \$33,665.39. Therefore, net income is \$5,138.51. The gross income includes pledges, collection plate, rentals, fundraising, special donations. Pledges make up 77% of our income. Thank you to all for your generous donations. Please continue to make every effort to meet your financial commitment.

The Faith Duffy Challenge is going well. Members and friends have donated \$3,890 in cash donations and pledges. We're close to closing the budget gap, so if you haven't contributed to the challenge fund, I hope you will do so before the end of the fiscal year. And THANK YOU to those who have already contributed.

Other Finance news:

- We earned \$332 from the Book and Bake Sale. Our next fundraiser is the Holiday Fair on Dec. 6 and 7.
- On Oct. 27, a special collection was taken at the Sunday worship service for the newly created Minister's Discretionary Fund. We received \$534.09 in donations. Thank you for your generosity. The Fund's purpose is to help members in times of need. Rev. Tony and the Pastoral Care Team together administer the fund.
